## The Best Italian Sparklers

**I**T WASN'T TOO LONG AGO THAT, WHENEVER ITALIAN SPARKLING wine was mentioned, I would immediately think of Asti Spumante, a sweet, charming but simple wine made from Muscat grapes in the Piedmont region of northern Italy. For most Americans, Asti is the only spumante (the Italian word for "sparkling") they know.

But there is much more than Asti Spu-

Although Contratto produces a respected line of Piedmontese red wines, the family is most proud of its sparkling wines. The winery makes a superb Asti Spumante and a lively, fresh brut that is a blend of 20 percent Chardonnay grown in the Trentino-Alto Adige region and 80 percent Pinot Noir from the Oltrepò Pavese, an extension of the Piedmont hills that reaches into Lombardy.

Two newcomers to this fabled region are Americans John and Harry Mariani, who had great success with a fruity "pop" wine import called Riunite. They invested some of their profits in a wine operation named Banfi Vintners, establishing modern wineries in Tuscany and Piedmont. All of Banfi's Italian production is overseen by the highly respected enologist Ezio Rivella.

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and one of the best, Giacosa makes a minute quantity of brut sparkling wine in the tiny hilltop town of Neive, in the Barbaresco region. Founded in 1890, the Giacosa winery is best known for fine regional red wines. But the Extra Brut spumante has become much sought after.

Bruno Giacosa is a studious perfectionist who oversees every step of the winemaking process. He makes his brut from 100 percent Pinot Nero grapes grown in Oltrepò Pavese and ages it at least three years. The currently available version is the 1986. Only 1,600 cases were made; the wine sells for \$39 a bottle.

Another winery with exacting standards is Ferrari, which makes only sparkling wines produced using the metodo tradizionale. This winery is owned by the Lunelli family, and the wine is made by Mauro Lunelli.

"My goal is to make wines with elegance

and finesse," says Lunelli. "For this reason Chardonnay almost exclusively." His pride is the Giulio Ferrari Riserva del Forno, an exquisite Blanc de Blanc. The wine is rich and full with notes of honey and almond, equal in quality of the best tête de Chardonnay. It sells for \$60.
